Clergy Letter February

Can you believe it? Here we are in February of the new year! I have been told by my family that it is a sign of old age to see time galloping so fast, a bit like seeing the 12year old police officers around!

Of course, you are all continuing with those new year resolutions, aren't you? We try so hard to instil a new regime of healthy living



into our lives every turn of the year, but it is quite hard to continue with enthusiasm as the weeks go by. The excuses about the weather and the dark days creep in and our resolve dwindles. You are reading of one who knows!

I wonder if you made any resolutions on the first of January to upgrade your spiritual well-being? Have you thought about taking up a daily reading of Bible passages, a quiet prayer time each day, an intention to attend church more often. These resolutions are not bound by the weather or require a subscription to a gym, but they are just as important to our inner wellbeing.

So here we are in February, still only a small step into the new year, and possibly we are still able to create a new purpose in our lives. If you want to feel really good about your life in 2024 you could combine your good intentions; a daily walk with prayer time combined, a jog with The Bible in a Year podcast on your headphones, or even a 5 minute slot in church as you bring in your Foodbank contributions.

Nothing needs to be out of your reach. We know God is with us – a message sent to us in the good news of the birth of Jesus at Christmas –and our lives are enriched by so much if we can engage in a two-way relationship with him. How you choose to keep up those good intentions is entirely up to you, but February is only the second month of this new year and still a good time to keep that enthusiasm going.

Life without goals can be a dull and meaningless passage of time, but the sense of wellbeing can be improved with such small steps as a daily conversation with God. To spend a few minutes at the end of a day thanking him for some of the good things that have happened, can give you a quiet mind to be able to drift off to sleep. Did you hear the birds sing? Did you have a phone conversation with someone? Did you receive a smile from a stranger at the shops? Did you laugh out loud at a funny story or the antics of a squirrel in your garden?

It doesn't take much to appreciate that God is in our lives in all sorts of ways every day, it takes just a small step for us to let him know we are aware of this by our response to him. You see, our new year resolution, to spend time with God, need not be arduous, expensive, or weather related, so see how long you can keep this goal of spiritual wellbeing active through this year.

Lent 2024 – Act on Poverty

This year, we are using the Christian Aid resource – Act on Poverty as the focus of our Lent study. The course explores six themes:



1. Prophetic

This session looks at what it means for churches to speak prophetically. The Bible shows us that being a prophet is far from easy. Many prophets have felt powerless, despite being called by God to speak out. How, with God's help, can your church develop its prophetic voice when speaking about poverty?

2. Broken

We are increasingly aware of the divisiveness of politics in the UK today. But this is not the only place where there is division. Our churches, our world, our selves are all in need of redemption and repair. This session helps you discuss division and brokenness in our different contexts. The resource opens up space to think together about where repentance is needed, and how we can be part of God's healing and redeeming work.

3. Generous

Many people in the UK are having to tighten their belts due to the costof-living crisis. In this session we take a close look at the lived experience of poverty, both near to home and around the world. We explore poverty as a justice issue that demands action. Churches can explore what it might mean to be 'generous' or 'cheerful givers' (2 Corinthians 9.7) when we feel like we have nothing to spare. What gifts do we have that we can share?

4. Located

Beginning with reflections on where Jesus chose to place himself during his ministry, this session equips your church to look afresh at where you are located. This includes your physical environment, community resources, local concerns and priorities. Groups can explore questions about how we discern what God is already doing in our community, about life on the margins, and who has power in your locality.

5. Hopeful

This session helps churches outline their hopes for the future and turn these hopes into a manifesto for action. There are practical ideas about facilitating events and community discussion in the lead up to the General Election. And there's an exploration of how nurturing hope can be part of our calling to love our neighbour. What will your church do to grow hope in 2024?

6. Together

Our final session looks at what we can do together to tackle poverty, local and global. This resource focuses on practical action in community, suggesting a range of ways to come together, perhaps hosting a shared meal or event to which you can invite your Prospective Parliamentary Candidates and MP's. Sharing time, ideas and food as we plan to Act on Poverty together.

Saint of the Month - February 18th Feb: Fra Angelico, patron of artists

If you enjoy drawing or painting, Fra Angelico is the patron saint for you. This devout Dominican priest of the Early Renaissance (1387-1455) used his superlative talent to the glory of God to such an extent that even six centuries later we are inspired and blessed by his art.

For while you may not be familiar with his name,



but you'll know his work: Fra Angelico's *The Annunciation* or *Adoration of the Magi* has adorned many classical Christmas cards. He is reckoned to be one of the greatest Italian painters of the 15th century.

Fra Angelico was born at Vicchio near Florence, and as a young friar worked at illuminating manuscripts such as the *Dominican Diurnal*. Ordained priest at Fiesole in 1418, he continued painting, spending the 1430s decorating the interior of the friary of San Marco, Florence with his masterpieces. Work at the Vatican followed, especially his paintings of Stephen and Laurence in the chapel of the artistic pope Nicholas V.

Fra Angelico's work is sublime, revealing a marvellous command of colour, light and perspective. It radiates spiritual serenity, and a dedication to God that is matched by few others. He has been described by experts as having "a rare and perfect talent", and that "it is impossible to bestow too much praise on this holy father, who was so humble and modest in all that he did and said, and whose pictures were painted with such facility and piety."

From 1449 to 1452 Fra Angelico was prior of Fiesole. Then he moved to Rome, where three years later he died. He was beatified in 1960 and declared patron of artists in 1984. Pope John Paul II described his paintings as 'miracles'.

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Bible: Genesis

This is the first of a new series aimed at providing an overview of the Bible. This month we consider the first book, Genesis.

As the title suggests, Genesis is primarily about beginnings. In chapters 1-11, it records the creation of the heavens and the earth and human beings; marriage and family; sin's effect on society and the world. The following chapters record God's dealings with Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Joseph, and their families. In this story of the Patriarchs we see God establishing a people called to bless the world, as He blesses them.

The book of Genesis is key to understanding the whole Bible. It is supremely about relationships; the relationships between God and the created order, God and human beings, and between human beings themselves. Fundamentally man has been created in the image of God, so that he can relate to God in a personal way: *'God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them'* (1:27). However, Genesis plots how this relationship was broken by sin, when Adam and Eve disobeyed God, resulting in the fall of human beings and the created order. By creating people with free will, God risked the possibility that they might reject Him. This is inherent in His love for human beings.

In Genesis, God enters into covenants with the world (the rainbow following the flood) and with Abraham and his descendents (circumcision), pledging His love and faithfulness to them and calling them to respond to Him in faith. It reminds us that God is fundamental to living. Without a sense of the centrality of God's place in our lives, we can never get our lives right.

From the Archives

There was a lot happening at St Mary's and its school in 1881. Only a month for the summer holiday so that there was enough time to prepare for the exams in November. However, before then, there was the promise of a treat such as a day in Harrogate!

THE INSPECTION OF THE SCHOOL

In the religious instruction the children have received throughout the Year will be held on Monday, July 11th, at quarter past nine in the morning, by the Rev. R. J. Crosthwaite. It is most important that our children should be well grounded in the principles of the Christian faith, and this we endeavour to do daily so far as the allotted time permits. The Inspection in some measure shows how far we have been successful, and is a stimulus and encouragement to children and teachers alike. I therefore earnestly ask the parents to help us by taking care that the children are present in good time. I hope that none will be absent when the Inspector arrives. The School will break up for the

SUMMER HOLIDAYS,

on Friday, July 15th, and re-open on Monday, August 15th. The visit of 15. M's: Inspector is due in November, and as it is most important for the children to have at least three months of uninterrupted work previous to the examination, it is not advisable to fix the holidays for a later date. It is proposed to hold the

ANNUAL TREAT FOR THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

during the month. Tea will be provided in the afternoon in the Schoolroom. After tea the children will play in the vicarage field till dusk. I hope that this year we shall be favoured with fine weather, and that those friends who have usually helped to provide the funds will kindly assist us again. Most of you are aware that the

SUNDAY AFTERNOON CHOIR

is composed exclusively of children belonging to the Sunday School-They meet for practice on Friday Evenings, and come with great regularity on Sundays, and materially assist in rendering our First Evensong an acceptable service. As some little encouragement and reward for their voluntary help, I promised to give them a treat in the summer, by taking them to Harrogate or some similar place for the day. I do not wish to make a special appeal for this treat. I believe that by the exercise of a little indicious economy, the subscriptions usually given for the Sunday School treat will defray the expenses of both.


