

Clergy Letter March

Dear Friends,

Some of you may be aware that recently I was acting in the Clifford Drama Group pantomime. Oh yes I did!

It was my first foray onto the stage in speaking roles; I have before played a dog with one woof and a page who delivered something on a cushion, other



than that my usual role has been to portray an angel in school nativities. This time I had three characters to play, three sets of lines to learn and many stage instructions to remember in the correct order. But I really enjoyed myself.

It struck me during rehearsals how like church the panto was. Oh yes it is!

All the performers had their parts to play and each relied on the others to get their lines correct in order to know when to either speak or come on stage. There was little room for maneuver as we rehearsed under the keen eyes of our directors. We listened to them and they listened to us when we made suggestions about movement or song or costume. It was a team effort.

In our villages Rev Nick would not be able to do what he does without his team, Emma in the office (we would all be lost without her! Oh yes we would!), Jo working with 20-40s and Trish and myself.

But the cast list doesn't stop there. Without the skills and commitment of other people we would not be able to do what we do - churchwardens, organists, sacristans, servers, readers, intercessors, flower arrangers, cleaners, vergers, singers, musicians . . . the list goes on.



In every good production, and there have been studies produced which equate church services with theatrical performances, there needs to be a team of people to make the performance work. Oh yes there does!

The church doesn't magically prepare itself for a service and we don't come onto the sanctuary stage without preparation. Those we cannot see are as important as those we do. Without backstage support our panto would not have been as successful as it was, it would have been drab to watch and musically bereft. We rely on our friends and family for support but most importantly we trust that God is with us as we prepare to deliver his message. Without the Holy Spirit our services would be dull and lifeless. Oh yes they would!

Last but not least the panto would have not worked without the audience and their engagement. Without people to get involved in the performance the cast and crew would have felt disappointed and disheartened. As it was the audiences really enjoyed themselves and we had lots of really positive comments post-performance.

We need that too in our churches. Maybe not applause but don't feel shy about telling us if you feel a service has worked well, or the sermon was thoughtful, the music was great, or the servers did a good job. We also like to hear constructive criticism or questions about why we do what we do. Maybe most of all we like to hear the voices that say, 'I wonder if I could help in some way?' 'I wonder if I could do that?' Our churches would not stay alive if it weren't for all of us, so don't hold back, get involved!

Oh yes you can!

22 March - Mothering Sunday and Mother Church

The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigors of Lent were relaxed more than was normal for a feast day. It is called Mothering Sunday as a reference to the Epistle reading for the Day (Galatians 4:21-31). The Lenten Epistles follow from each other with teaching about our life as Christians and how we are to follow Christ.

On Mid-Lent Sunday the Epistle talks of bondage and freedom; the bondage of the Law and the Old Covenant as compared to the freedom in Christ, "the promised one", and the New Covenant. Verse 26 reads "But Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all." We gain our freedom from Christ and, as it was seen before the Reformation, the Church.

Thus, Mothering Sunday is about the freedom that we gain through the promise of Jesus Christ delivered through our Mother the Church. People were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Hence apprentices, and others, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

On the other hand, Mother's Day is a secular festival invented in 1904 and is celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May in most countries in the world. The UK seems to be the exception. In recent years Mothering Sunday has been hijacked to take the place of a special, secular day to give thanks for our mothers.



What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Bible: Exodus

This month we are looking at Exodus, the second book of the Old Testament. Its name means departure, reminding us that Israel's flight out of slavery in Egypt is the major focus of the book.

Exodus is a book of two halves! The first part (chapters 1-19 & 32-34) is the story of an oppressed people who are delivered from slavery into a life of freedom. The second half (chapters 20-31 & 35-40) consists of detailed instructions about the life and worship of God's people. The book introduces us to their *salvation* or deliverance, as *story*. God's promises to Abraham are fulfilled as the people journey to the Promised Land. He also renews His covenant with them at Sinai, expressed in the Ten Commandments (20: 1-17).

At the heart of Exodus is the person of God Himself. In chapter 3 God reveals His name as YHWH or '*I am who I am*' (3:14) to Moses. This is the name by which God is known throughout the Old Testament, expressed in the title '*the LORD*'. To know God's name is to know Him, as well as His character ie His justice, truthfulness, mercy, faithfulness and holiness. He is the God who controls history, delivering the people out of Egypt, while the death of the Passover lamb points us to Jesus' death on the cross (1 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promises of help remain true for us today: 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today' Exodus 14:13.



1973 saw a parish outing to the north-east with a packed day.

PARISH OUTING

Saturday morning, the 8th September, dawned brightly with the promise of a day's settled weather — just what was required for a successful Parish Outing.

We left Boston Spa at 8-30 a.m. and a full coachload settled down to the first part of our journey which was to take us via the A1 and A19 to our initial stop to visit the ruins of Mount Grace Priory, or to give its full title, The House of the Assumption of the Most Blessed Virgin and St. Nicholas of Mount Grace at Ingleby.

The Priory was founded by the Carthusian Order in 1397 where the monks, according to their strict rule, lived in separate cells.

We were greeted by the custodian Harvey Haines who gave us a most interesting talk about the history of the Priory and the Carthusian Order during which we learned how the Prior of the Grand Chartreuse. the Mother house of the Order, had given his assent to the nomination of the first prior at Mount Grace.

After wandering awhile amongst the ruins we re-commenced the journey to our next destination which was to be St. Paul's Church and the Monastery at Jarrow. Our arrival co-incided with lunch time and a short detour to South Shields enabled us to enjoy the hospitality which had been offered by the members of St. Hilda's Church at South Shields when they had learnt earlier of our proposed visit to Jarrow. Here at the Youth Centre we were kindly provided with tea, coffee and fellowship to supplement our packed lunches.

We found the ancient church of St. Paul's standing in a park area close to a modern oil installation and other industrial establishments.

Here we learnt how originally two Saxon Churches had been built on the site about 15 feet apart. After the destruction of the Monastery by the Vikings the two Churches were joined together by a tower and the smaller Saxon Church, Tower and remains of the Norman Monastery are still standing.

Our visit was in the form of a modern day pilgrimage as this year marks the 1,300th anniversary of the birth of the Venerable Bede who in the original monastery at Jarrow did so much to enrich the art of learning and where besides being a Theologian and Biblical Commentator he was a Scientist, Geographer and Historian. A very fine carving of the Venerable Bede, which was produced from a tree trunk, now stands in the church beneath the tower.

Our journey then took us back along the A1 to the City of Durham where after Evensong we enjoyed a conducted tour of this magnificent Cathedral during which we were reminded of our visit to Jarrow when we saw the tomb of the Venerable Bede.

We all joined together to enjoy an excellent meal at the Douglas Restaurant in Durham which rounded off a memorable day finally arriving back in Boston Spa at 9-30 p.m.

Our grateful thanks go to John Townend whose careful planning enabled yet another successful Parish Outing to run so smoothly, also to Brian the coach driver whose co-operation and cheerfulness are becoming part of our outings. EffTee.

Tree Works by Boston Spa Wetherby & Villages Green Group



We started planting trees at Wattle Syke a couple of years ago and this year, we replaced a few trees that died in the summer drought (amazing how little we lost). We've also reinforced the boundary hedge with 160 hawthorn and a few crab apple. To date, we've planted over 350 trees at Wattle Syke.

Along the boundary wall between the Church and the car park at Church Fields, planting was put in about 10 years ago which we've done some work on as otherwise, some of the young trees would grow very large and obscure the view of the Church as you enter Boston Spa. So we cut down,



coppiced or layered some of these as part of a new hedge along the wall. With correct cutting, this hedge will be thick and full of wildlife, and grow in height about a metre in 30 years.

The trees around the car park at Church Fields will also be worked on to create short sections of hedge with the aim to enhance the best trees and enrich the habitat of the area. The meadow hedge at Church Fields is also being worked on in sections and has had about 35 new trees planted this year.

Boston Spa Surgery, Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Notes from meeting held on 16th January 2024

Alison Briscombe, the Practice Manager, was pleased to report that the alterations at the Surgery are complete with a new 7th clinical room created plus a new meeting room and an improved office for herself. The improved ramp access and automatic doors are much appreciated by patients and an automated door opening device will be fitted to the front door as soon as possible. The new PPG noticeboard provides information relating to matters raised by patients and actions taken in response to these matters. There is now a reserved parking bay for disabled patients holding the appropriate badge which is currently indicated by a blue sign in the carpark even though at present it is also indicated as a reserve space for Doctors. Arrangements are in hand for the usual disabled sign to put in place on the parking bay.

The staffing team has been enhanced by 3 paramedics being appointed to our Primary Care Network (PCN). Leanne and Sarah are our visiting paramedics who look after the 5 practices in our PCN doing home visits. Lewis is our ACP (advanced clinical practitioner) paramedic who holds a clinic in the surgery on a Tuesday. Lewis is qualified to prescribe medication.

In attendance at our meeting were Jo Lee and Steph Morton who are the surgery's Care Coordinators whose role is to focus on those patients who are especially frail or vulnerable. Jo and Steph visit patients in the safety of their homes and listen to their health concerns or care needs and put them in touch with appropriate clinicians when needed. They are also able to help those who are dealing with loneliness or feeling isolated. Jo and Steph will also make sure that these patients have had a structured medication review to ensure they are on the most appropriate medication. Do please contact the reception team if you know of anyone who might benefit from seeing a care coordinator.

The current Shingles Campaign entitles everyone aged between 70 and 79 to receive the vaccine as are those who were aged 65 as from the 1st September 2023. Also, those with a weakened immune system and are aged 50 may receive the vaccine. Please enquire at the surgery if you wish to receive this important vaccine.

I know I always end this brief report by saying how fortunate we are in having an excellent GP Surgery in our village but it remains true. We must continue to do what we can to help them to help us. Do let the receptionists have your mobile phone number and email address in order to speed up communications and if you are not already using the online facility, please join up – it's quite easy since even I can use it!
